

Welcome Remarks by Dean of Humanities George Justice

Keynote Address: "Asian Studies across Academies" by Thongchai Winichakul

Thongchai Winichakul is professor of history at the University of Wisconsin–Madison and past president of the Association for Asian Studies (AAS). His book Siam Mapped (1994) was awarded the Harry J. Benda Prize from the AAS in 1995 and has been translated into Japanese and Thai; the Korean and Chinese editions will be published soon. He was a recipient of the John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship in 1994 and elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2003. His research interests are in the cultural and intellectual history of Siam, including nationalism, modern geography and cartography, and historical knowledge. He is currently working on the intellectual foundations of modern Siam (1880s–1930s) and on a book about memories of the 1976 massacre in Bangkok.
