ANNUAL MEETING

The organizers of the 1972 WCAAS Annual Meeting at the University of Utah express their appreciation for the opportunity to host the 1972 meeting and extend a cordial welcome to all participants.

With the exception of the events of Saturday afternoon and evening, all activities will take place on the campus of the University of Utah. Founded in 1850, the University of Utah is one of 99 major state universities and land-grant institutions in the United States and Puerto Rico. There are currently over 22,000 students enrolled in the University from more than 50 foreign countries and all 50 states.

Programs of instruction and research are offered in the Graduate School and 14 separate colleges. Bachelor's degrees may be earned in 64 fields of study and Master's and Doctor's degrees are offered in many disciplines.

The University's 1168 acre campus complex of academic buildings and a research park spreads along the western edge of the rugged Wasatch

mountain range. Salt Lake City, a progressive urban and industrial center of the Intermountain West, is five minutes away. Ready access to the mountain country surrounding the campus and a four-season climate invite participation in outdoor life from camping, hiking, boating, fishing to unexcelled powder skiing. Four world-famous ski areas are within 45 minutes of the campus.

A recently completed campus development program has kept pace with the University's academic and research expansion. Over half of the 110 permanent buildings have been built in the past decade. The focal point of the campus is the Marriott Library with holdings in excess of a million and a half volumes.

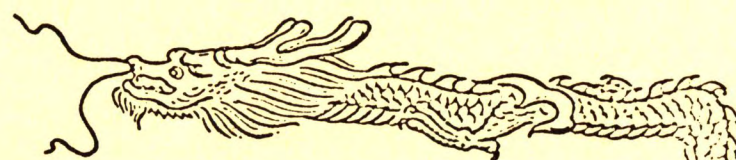
